We are now in full swing of our 2022-23 season and our first annual event is on the horizon and scheduled for later this month.

On the Sunday following Thanksgiving the C-PP Sports Hall of Fame will be holding its annual fund raising bowling event. The event will take place on Sunday, November 27th at Crystal Lanes and is open to anyone wishing to help support the Hall of Fame.

It is our only fund raiser with all the funds going towards helping with the expenses of our annual induction dinner along upkeep of our newly designed web page which includes our up to date Facebook page.

Our bowling event is open to the public. It's a four-person per team, with a 9-pin, no-tap format. That means any first ball that knocks down nine pins will count as a strike. To secure a spot in the bowling event, contact Hall of Fame director Bobby Downing at Crystal Lanes during regular business hours. The event will be limited to the first 30 teams who sign up. Entry blanks are available at Crystal Lanes and on our website. Keep in mind, you do not need to be a league bowler to participate. It's a fun event. The winners receive a plaque. There is no prized money involved.

The deadline for nominees has passed. It was October 31st. Any resumes after that date will be kept on file to be considered for next year.
